It is hard to believe that Advent is just around the corner. Our theme this year is: Prepare the Way. I believe it speaks to the season in which we find ourselves a community of faith.

Your Session has been preparing. Over the past six months, the Session has prepared and presented Ministry Snapshots which provided holistic reviews of our ministries at the church. Each Ministry Snapshot provided a 360 review of our ministry areas. The Snapshots assessed our councils, budgets, staffing, and reach of our ministries. The Session's work has prepared

them in the coming year to begin to take the next steps to discern who and where God is calling us.

Your Associate Pastor Nominating Committee has been *preparing*. They have been working, praying and discerning who God is calling to join our family of faith as the new Associate Pastor for Mission and Outreach. They have *prepared* a Church Information Form outlining who we are as a community of faith for potential candidates. They have *prepared* interview questions. They have *prepared* to step into the holy space of discernment with candidates from across the country. As of this writing they are *preparing* to invite some candidates to Dallas for face-to-face interviews. They know a little about *preparing*.

The Generosity Team, which planned, coordinated and continues to execute our Commit Season has been *preparing*. They have *prepared* innovative ways for us to grow in faith through setting new commitment goals for this year. They have *prepared* letters, notes, meet and greets, and new avenues to help us grow in faith. They have *prepared* so that we can live more fully into God's vision for Preston Hollow.

The Youth Ministry has been *preparing*. They have worked diligently and faithfully with Youth Ministry Architects, and have *prepared* goals, values, and a vision for the future of the Youth Ministry. They have *prepared* new ministry plans. The Director of Youth Ministries Search Team is *preparing* to welcome new leadership in that ministry area for the first time in twenty years.





Paul: Evangelizer, Entrepreneur, and Theologian led by The Reverend Margaret Watkins

More than a quarter of the New Testament is associated with a man who was not a disciple of Jesus. In the Greek New Testament 217 of 895 pages are written by Paul, and this figure does not include Acts where Paul is a significant figure. Yet Paul does not dominate early Christianity the way he dominates the New Testament. At the time of the Apostles, he was considered an upstart and an outsider. After canonization his letters became tremendously formative in what Christianity believed, but at the time of composition they did not represent the majority view. What happened?

What do we make of the controversy surrounding Paul's letters today? Join us for a presentation of "Paul: Evangelizer, Entrepreneur, and Theologian."

As we anticipate Advent and the Christmas season, we can also look forward to having our sanctuary decorated for the entire month of December in celebration of our Lord's birth. Presbyterian Women embarked upon the Christmas Tree Initiative in the spring of 2014 to encourage and support the creation of handmade ornaments of heirloom quality. These ornaments were beautifully displayed upon matching trees placed on either side of the chancel during Advent last year. Chrismons and Christian Symbols were lovingly created by many ladies of PW. Chrismon is a copyrighted name derived from "Christ" and "monogram"

denoting the ornaments created using only white and gold. Christian Symbols describes the counted cross-stitch ornaments with an added touch of green and red. Designs include various styles of crosses and stars, the descending dove, manger, chalice, oil lamp, fish, angels, butterflies, and other images reflecting Jesus' ministry and teachings. Ceremony "Unlocks" Cottages at Hickory Crossing

fter ten years of planning, the
Cottages at Hickory Crossing, built
to provide permanent homes for
50 of Dallas' chronically homeless, and
fueled in part by a grant from the Preston
Hollow Presbyterian Foundation, opened
its doors in early September. Our \$50,000
grant, made possible by the generosity
of Foundation donors over the years,
provided for one of the fully outfitted,
400-square-foot houses. More than \$4000
from "Every Dollar Counts" collections
over the summer helped provide extras like
sheets and towels, kitchen items, etc.

The Hickory Crossing project, spearheaded by Poverty Czar Larry James and CitySquare, reflects a growing "Housing First" trend across the country based on the premise that "the solution to homelessness is homes." Providing homes to some of the most vulnerable people, and the toughest cases, in Dallas County has strong humanitarian underpinnings, but the approach is practical as well. The 50 people chosen to live in the cottages are not only

some of the neediest, but also some of the most expensive to Dallas County taxpayers. Many have spent time in jail, or in the Parkland Health and Hospital System, or have needed emergency services.

The PHPC Foundation was founded more than two decades ago by a handful of far-sighted members who recognized the power of making legacy gifts that could sustain Preston Hollow's ministries

within the church, in the community and beyond for generations to come. People make gifts to the Foundation out of appreciation for the role the Church has played in



their lives and the Foundation invests those gifts, endowing them permanently, using market appreciation to do good in the world. The Cottages at Hickory Crossing are an example of how legacy giving can extend Preston Hollow's discipleship into the darkest corners or our community.

PHPC Foundation to offer two grant cycles a year

In a departure from its current policy of accepting grant applications every year in October, the Foundation's Board of Trustees recently voted to open the application process two times a year, in the fall and the spring. "Opening the process more than once a year gives us double the opportunities to communicate the power and promise of Foundation giving to every ministry of the church," said Foundation Board of Trustees

Chair Anne Smith. "We will be visiting all of the councils in advance of each grant cycle to ensure that church leaders are well informed about the various designated and unrestricted funds that are available for grants."

SESSION IN A NUTSHELL HIGHLIGHTS FROM AUGUST AND SEPTEMBER

AUGUST SESSION MEETING

Pastor's report: Rev. Matthew Ruffner spoke on a number of items regarding the upcoming fall season and 2017.

Worship Update: Much was learned in the reality of summer programming. It was great to see families worshiping together.

Communication plans for every aspect of fall worship have been developed.

Commit Season: Commit Sunday will be October 30, which is also Kirkin o' the Tartans Sunday.

Transition Consultation Update: Our search
for the right professional to work with PHPC
leadership and the congregation as we move
forward in our ministry continues. Matthew
reported that the Clerk will be traveling to Seattle on September 14
to meet with a strong candidate to work with us.

2017 Personal Goals:

Matthew's goals include the following:

- Continue to grow in preaching
- · Have conversations with Dallas religious leaders of all faiths
- · Have PHPC staffed for our present and future

Financial highlights: Trey Angel reported, in part, the following on behalf of the Finance Committee:

- The June 2016 reports are skewed somewhat due to having three payrolls in the month.
- Net cash reserves continue to be ample, sufficient for 2.7 months of church operations.
- The 2017 operating budget contains a \$231K deficit.

Rev. Dr. Seelman reported that our objective is to grow receipts during 2017. The new Generosity Team is in place and working toward that objective. It is possible that we may need to renegotiate our fees with the Preston Hollow School. They pay us \$43,000 per year and this is unchanged over the last ten years. Rev. Seelman also pointed out that, if necessary, we have the ability to consolidate functions to reduce 2017 expenses.

Generosity Process Update: Matthew reported the Generosity Team is working. Asks this fall will be tailored to specific age groups. There will be no minutes for mission, but there will be generosity stories. Seven groups have been formed to focus on different age groups.

Staff Reports: Paul reported that he has moved his office to the first floor. Adrienne Nicholson reported that ice cream and hot dogs will be available on Sunday, September 4. Laura Fitzgibbon related that the Discipleship Committee has been meeting all summer. This is Dana Moffatt's last Session meeting as he is retiring September 2. This is also Rubie Loman's last meeting. Linda Smith reported that a benefits report will be forthcoming in the September meeting. Sarah Johnson reported that her graduate school is beginning.

SEPTEMBER SESSION MEETING

Pastor's Report: Rev. Matthew Ruffner spoke about transitional planning and the upcoming fall season.

Transition Planning: One of Matthew's goals in 2017 is for PHPC to be staffed well. To that end, job

descriptions for the Director of Senior High Ministry and Director of Communications have been prepared as the first step toward populating these positions. The APNC for the mission and outreach position are working well together. They have narrowed their search to six candidates. Matthew

continues his work of building working relationships with community leaders. He is having lunch this week with the Rector at St Michaels and All Angels

Financial highlights: Trey Angel reported, in part, the following on behalf of the Finance Committee:

- · Gifts and pledges were \$93,000 below forecast.
- Year to date revenue is \$458,000, compared to \$531,000 one year ago.
- Net cash reserves continue to be ample, sufficient for 2.4 months of church operations.

Generosity Process Update: Rev. Dr. Seelman updated the Session. The Generosity Team has been founded and a charter created. Generosity is a full year concept, not just during the traditional stewardship period. We are moving away from the word, "stewardship". The commit season begins with God, and the preaching series during this season is entitled, "Rooted in a Generous God."

A "thank you" plan has been created. Each Elder will hand write and sign thank you notes, also signed by Matthew, to be sent to members within two weeks of their commitment.

Revision to Child Protection Policy: A Motion from Staff
Committee to approve a change in the Policy for Safeguarding the
Well-Being of Children, Youth and At-Risk Adults was presented.
Following questions and discussion, the MOTION passed
unanimously.

Staff Reports: Rev. Sarah Johnson reminded that outreach communion is this coming Sunday. Rev. Laura Fitzgibbon reported that through the second week of adult Sunday School, response is very positive.

LESSONS LEARNED:

NICARAGUA MISSION

icaragua can feel like a series of juxtapositions: impossibly beautiful beaches paired with inescapable poverty; political corruption of all stripes interrupted by a deep belief in the revolutionary power of the people; and in my case, a young white American working alongside Nicaraguan people to accomplish hard and important work.

I spent 2.5 years living in Managua and working across the country with PHPC mission partner CEPAD. Perhaps the most important truth I learned is that when you see two things that seem like they don't go together, you must look closer.

PHPC first connected with CEPAD, the Nicaraguan Council of Protestant Churches, in 2008. We formed a partnership — one of about 15 U.S. churches that has done so since the late 90s — and pledged to support the organization for at least five years. From 2013-2015, part of that support meant funding a stipend so I could serve CEPAD as a communications manager and jack-of-all-trades. Many at PHPC remember CEPAD as the organization with whom we did "the stove project" — but of course there is much more to the story.







CEPAD formed in 1972 as a response to an earthquake that devastated Managua. Today it operates small teams of Nicaraguan experts in six regions around the Central-American country to provide sustainable relief from the daily poverty and natural disasters that most impact people in rural villages. With a particular focus on training for farmers, women, and youth, CEPAD seeks to mobilize the existing resources of communities and guide them toward a better future.

Life in Nicaragua feels nothing like life in the U.S., and the daily reality is mostly unfathomable to anyone who has not seen it firsthand. Because it is so far away, because the challenges are so great, and because CEPAD has done such great work for so many years, we may struggle to understand how we fit in. What do we know about the needs of people in Nicaragua? What could we possibly provide besides money to support the programs?

The second most important thing I learned in Nicaragua is what you know is not nearly as important as the humility you need

to realize you don't know everything. Right when I arrived in Managua, I accompanied a group of PHPC youth on a delegation. CEPAD's delegation trips are more like education trips focused on building relationships with Nicaraguans than what you might usually think of as a mission trip, but there usually is a service component of some kind. In our case, we spent much of one afternoon in a village called El Ingenio hacking away at a large field of weeds with machetes. As we finished up, leaving an uneven field in our wake, one of the young women from PHPC had a moment of revelation: "The two men from the village who were helping us could have done this whole thing twice as well in half the time."

To truly enter into partnership, we must relinquish the conceit of what we know or what we have to offer and instead meet our partners as friends and equals. It is only then that in the fullness of God we can do the hard, important work of sharing our gifts and talents to live out the blessings we have — whether we are in Dallas or in the small village of El Ingenio.

The Nicaragua Mission Committee is planning a delegation trip to work with CEPAD for June 17-24, 2017. This is a great opportunity for active adults of all ages as well as families with older children. PHPC senior high youth will also be in Nicaragua during the same dates for their annual mission trip.
